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Upstate Circle of Friends' success will focus on growing awareness of the UHM clinic location on the UCF campus, offering a full spectrum of needed services, i.e. medical, mental health, wellness and parenting classes, instructions for backyard gardening, food boxes, etc. for the District 25 and surrounding Hispanic and uninsured populations. As current program attendees come onto the UCF campus, they will leave with an awareness of all the additional wellness services offered. Through word of mouth, handouts, presentations to neighborhood associations, social media, etc. it is anticipated the UHM clinic established at UCF will quickly become a trusted provider of services.



Unity Health on Main's collaboration with our partners will successfully meet the needs of our growing Hispanic and uninsured populations that require a new strategy and approach to delivering services. This collaborative partnership and expanding services to Upstate Circle of Friends, located in the middle of a service desert, will create a one-stop shop to minimize the need for our community members to make long and multiple trips and miss work to access needed service. This program will reduce the issues that arise when patients experience financial and legal issues and reduce the utilization of emergency services. By breaking down several barriers that inhibit access to care and creating a safe and welcoming space, our families will be comfortable seeking care at both locations. That is our sign of success!

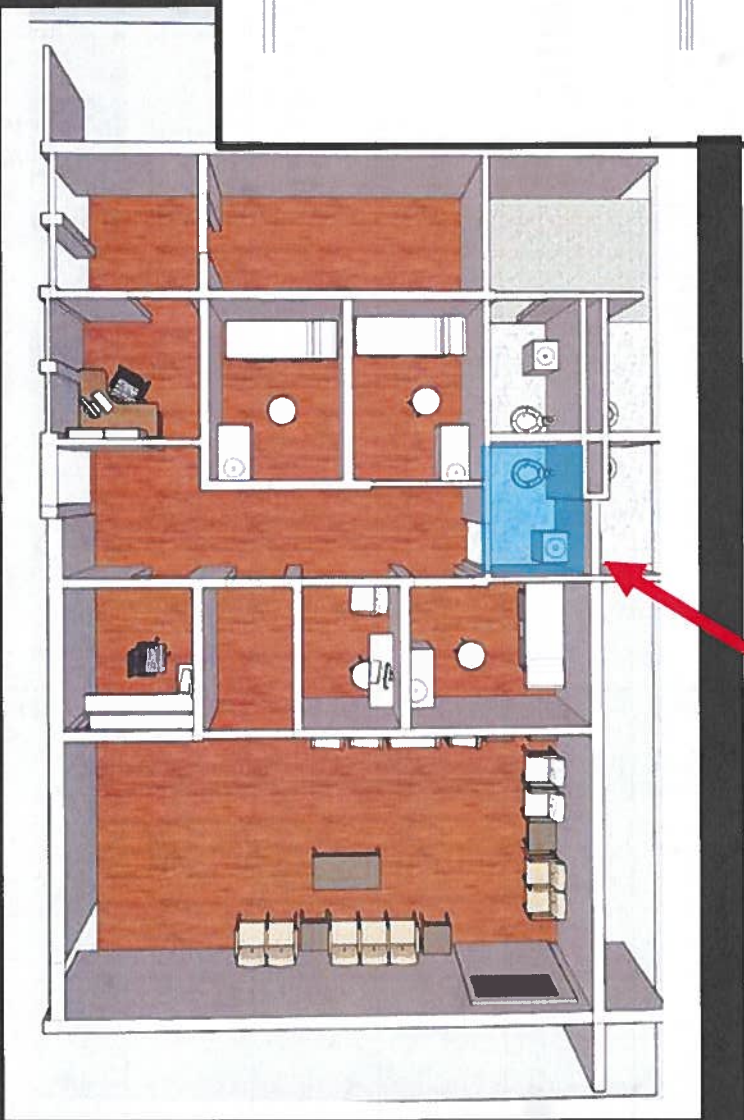
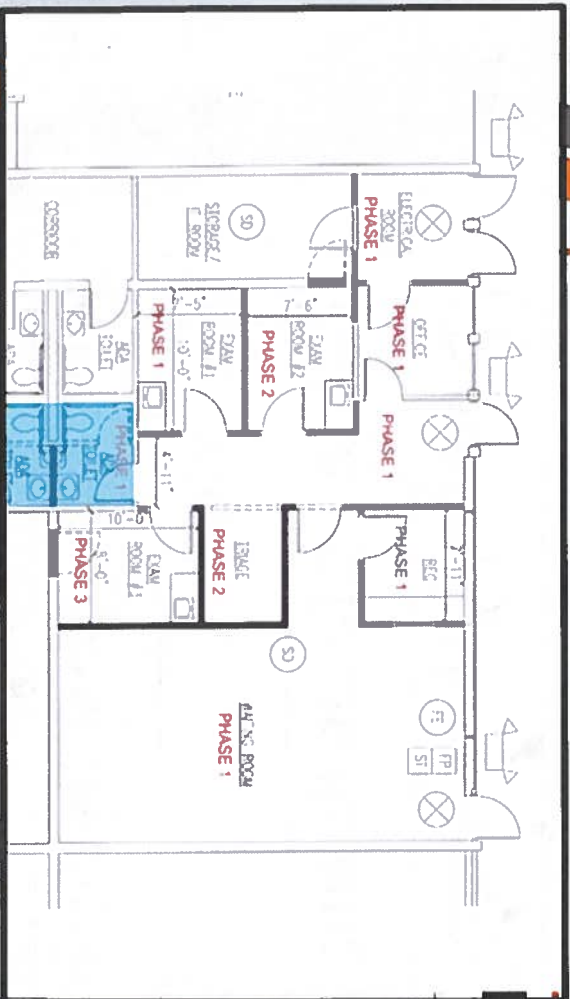


Universal Therapeutic Services measures the success of increasing services while significantly decreasing depression, anxiety, and trauma outcomes for clients with these diagnoses. This collaboration will help increase mental health education outreach and research efforts for those served by continuing to engage in the production of virtual and live seminars, video podcasts, and other social media productions focused on breaking the stigma, identification of mental health symptoms, and access to service. Additional measurements will include monitoring the following methodologies to ensure consistent insight into interventions and population well-being.



Through quantitative and qualitative data, the American Heart Association will look at overall success based on blood pressure, glucose levels, and healthy lifestyle changes. Blood pressure and glucose measures can be reported with unidentified information for the initial reading and final controlled reading. Anecdotal information will also be recorded and collected as clinicians and patients work together to understand personal barriers and challenges to lifestyle changes. With lifestyle education, a post-survey will be given to understand what the client has learned and how they plan to implement healthy lifestyle changes.

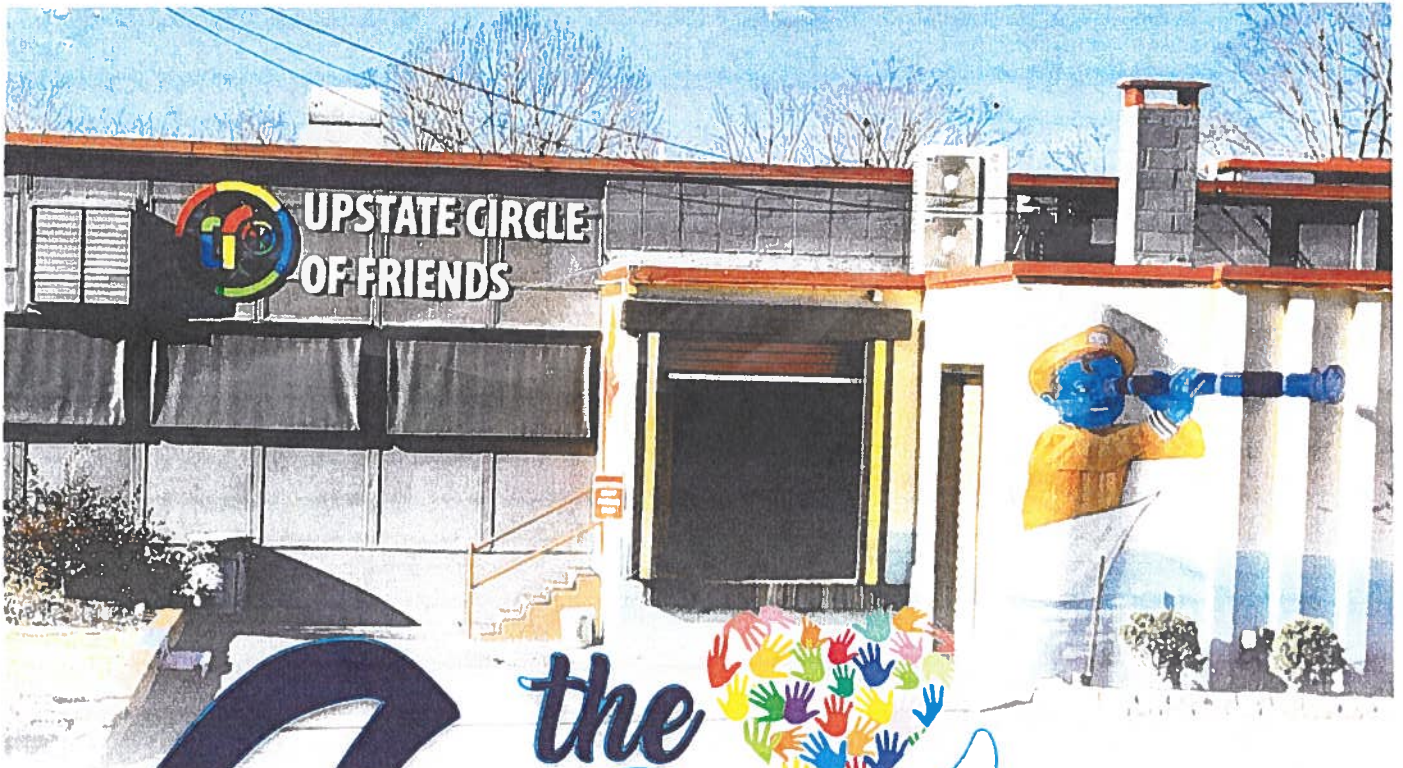

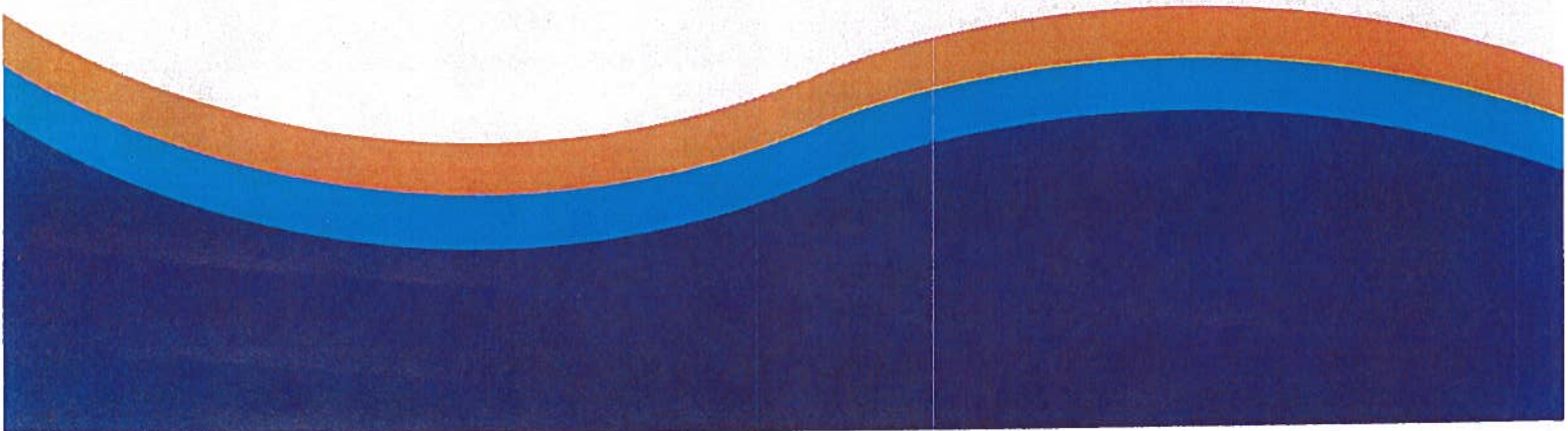

District 25 Historical Narrative

In 1942 the US Military established what was originally named Greenville Army Air Base to support the World War II effort. In 1948 the name was changed to Greenville Air Force Base and later in 1951 renamed Donaldson Air Force Base in honor the late John Owen Donaldson who was a Greenville native and flew for the Royal Air Force during World War I. He became an ace with eight victories during the war.

In January of 1963, Donaldson Air Force Base was deactivated and merged with Hunter Air Force Base, Georgia. The Air Force Base was deeded jointly to the City and County of Greenville and the entire 2600 acre facility was renamed Donaldson Center Airport. The name was later shortened to Donaldson Center and now known as SCTAC (South Carolina Technology and Aviation Center).

Many of the civilian employees of the Air Force Base lived within a 3 mile radius of the facility. Once closed, many of the former employees moved away creating a large housing surplus in the area which African American residents began to fill. This happened at the height of the Civil Rights Era which saw the passage of the Civil Rights Act, the Voting Rights Act, and the Fair Housing Act. Once African Americans began moving into the area, many of the remaining white residents participated in what was known at the time as white flight, opened even more housing for African Americans.

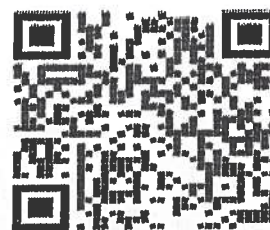
By the early 1970s, new African American neighborhoods and schools had been built to handle the significant increase in residents in the area. Additionally, the Voting Rights Act led to the end of multi-member districts and a change to single member districts, giving African Americans the opportunity to have elected representation for the first time in the history of Greenville County. The late 1970s saw a continued push to increase voter registration and participation among African Americans in District 25.

In 1984 Theo Michell was elected to the South Carolina State Senate and Rev. Dr. E.D. Dixon was elected to Greenville County Council. Later, Rev. Dr. W.B. McMahan was elected to represent District 25 in the South Carolina House of Representatives and Leola Robinson-Simpson on the Greenville County School Board. Today, District 25 is the only majority minority district in Greenville County comprised of almost 45,000 residents. Currently, Michelle Goodwin-Calwile represents the District on the Greenville County School Board, Dr. Ennis M. Fant, Greenville County Council, Wendell Jones, SC House of Representatives and Karl B. Allen, the SC State Senate.

With more industrial zoned property than any other district, District 25 leads the way in economic growth and job creation. District 25 is the home of the first and only Business and Technology District in Greenville County comprised of more than 1000 acres along the Highway 25 Corridor.

Additionally, SCTAC currently is the home for more than 120 businesses including 3M, Michelin and Lockheed Martin, home of the F-16 Fighter Jet.

With its current focus on expanding homeownership, revitalizing the Augusta Road Corridor at I-85, creating Greenville County's first Urban Development District; thus, creating a new gateway into Downtown Greenville, both the present and future are bright for District 25.

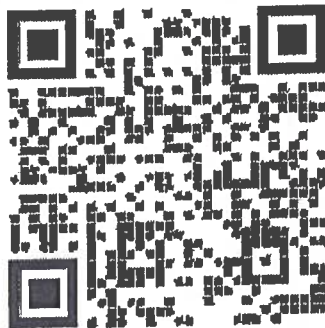
